Through the Lens of Reflection

Through our mission, Green Vale upholds a set of core values that include community, character, resourcefulness, reflection, and respecteach contributing uniquely to our vibrant community. This year's theme of "reflection" is more than just a word, it's deeply ingrained within our School's culture. Our teachers and students have embraced this theme wholeheartedly, weaving it into their daily lives and

academic lessons.



At the heart of Green Vale's commitment to reflection lies an understanding of its significant power. Through reflection, we pause, ponder, and understand with clear insight, allowing us to distill meaning from our experiences and chart a course for growth.

As we dove into the specifics of each academic division's celebration of reflection, it became evident that this theme is not merely a passing trend but a guiding principle. Explore some of the ways in which students and teachers have embraced and celebrated reflection throughout the year.

Reflection Through Literature

Early Childhood teachers utilize the power of age-appropriate literature to introduce and explore emotional concepts. Whether it's teaching the value of patience and waiting, what it means to be a good friend, or emotional regulation and empathy, literature serves as an invaluable tool. Through discussions and reflections, students can identify and understand emotions, allowing them

to navigate their own feelings and interactions with greater insight and understanding.

Spots of Emotions

Pre-Kindergarten teachers Jennifer Milillo and Kristin John have introduced a structured technique for recognizing, understanding, and reflecting on emotions in their classroom. Drawing inspiration from Diane Alber's A Little Spot of Emotion books, they've assigned specific emotions to different colored spots, creating what they call "spots of emotions." This approach helps children grasp abstract emotions by linking them to concrete visual cues, making the concept more tangible and manageable.

By associating each emotion with a spot, students can easily identify and label their feelings, laying the foundation for emotional awareness and regulation. As students progress through the spots, they learn strategies for managing their emotions and develop empathy by reflecting on how emotions manifest in others. Through this approach, Milillo and John aim to foster emotional intelligence and create a supportive learning environment where reflection and introspection can thrive.



Mindful Breathing

In Kindergarten, students experienced the power of mindful breathing. Under the guidance of GVS parent Bethany Kelsey, founder of Bridging Wellness-a coaching service that helps individuals build healthy habits into everyday life-students not only discovered the peace within themselves but also forged meaningful connections with their peers. Through this experience, Kindergarteners



we embraced the essence of reflection, unlocking their innate creativity and exemplifying the profound impact of approaching learning and leading with open minds.

Reflection Awards

In Lower School, the Reflection Awards initiative aims to instill he value of reflection among students by incorporating it into various aspects of school life. Each month, teachers nominate students who exemplify the value of reflection in four categories: Academic Reflection: Students demonstrate their ability to develop and review their skill knowledge through rubrics, reflection writing, and conversations with faculty, acknowledging areas for growth and improvement.

Creative Reflection: Students exhibit their capacity to make sense of their processes and practices during creative projects or activities, spanning various domains such as art, innovation labs, and crafts.



proficiency in understanding and managing social interactions, recognizing the emotions and perspectives of others and reflecting on ways to handle diverse situations with kindness and empathy.

Goal Reflections

At the beginning of the academic year, our 3rd Grade students set personal goals to strive for throughout the year. After returning from the winter break, they engaged in a reflective exercise to evaluate the progress made towards these goals. Students carefully considered whether they had achieved their objectives and identified the actions they took, or didn't take, that influenced their outcomes. These goals



ranged from mastering cursive writing to memorizing multiplication tables to honing sports skills. For those who reached their goals, it was an opportunity to set new ones for the remainder of the year. Conversely, for those whose goals remained unmet, they engaged in thoughtful discussions about strategies to employ moving forward. Common themes emerged during these reflections, with students recognizing the importance of increased practice, enhanced focus, and greater effort in achieving their aspirations.

Self-Image Reflection

In 6th Grade Wellness class, students covered important topics of self-image and self-esteem through a unique exercise involving animal

identification. Each student selected an animal they resonated with, identifying the creature's personality traits and characteristics. Using a split portrait format, students documented the traits shared with their chosen animal on one side, highlighting similarities in a visual representation. On the other side, they explored traits exhibited by the animal but not yet fully embodied in themselves. This exercise prompted deep reflection on personal identity and areas for growth, empowering students to consider who they are presently and how they aspire to evolve.

Anger Iceberg

Sixth Grade students learned all about the concept of the Anger Iceberg, a metaphorical representation where most of one's anger is hidden beneath the surface, much like the bulk of an iceberg lies submerged underwater. Drawing inspiration from the classic tale Alexander's No Good Very Bad Day, students embarked on a reflective journey, empathizing with the protagonist's emotional turmoil throughout the narrative. Through guided discussions and introspective activities, they dissected the range of emotions experienced by the character, pinpointing instances of anger and frustration. Using the Anger Iceberg framework as a tool for self-awareness, students identified and categorized these feelings, gaining insights into their own emotional responses and learning to recognize the deeper layers of their emotions.

Athletic Reflection: Students showcase their self-awareness as they reflect on their athletic performance, identifying actionable steps to enhance their skills and abilities in sports and physical activities.

Interpersonal Reflection: Students display their



Building Momentum Year 2 of the Strategic Plan

Our pursuit of educational excellence is central to our mission and a key aspect of our carefully designed Strategic Plan. This plan serves as a roadmap guiding us towards continual growth and innovation, ensuring alignment and excellence across all areas of our School.

As we embark on the second year of our five-year Strategic Plan, we wanted to update you on the initiatives and progress surrounding the categories of teaching, learning, and community. These encompass enhancing teaching practices, creating transformative learning experiences, and nurturing a vibrant sense of community within our School. While we realize this type of work may not always be "flashy," we felt it was important to highlight its immediate impact with our students and teachers.



Understanding How Kids Learn

Reflection and Metacognition

At the core of our teaching philosophy is a deep understanding of how children learn. New findings on reading acquisition have reshaped our approach, stressing the importance of early comprehension alongside language development—a significant shift that greatly impacts student learning.

In a recent lesson, 1st Grade teachers devised an analogy likening reading to a "salad." In this analogy, the lettuce symbolizes the ability to decode words (acquisition), while tomatoes represent the ability to understand the text (comprehension).

During a demonstration, teachers read aloud to students, unveiling the stark realization of limited comprehension. Introducing the 'salad'' concept, they visually showcased how lettuce (reading) alone lacked the richness of tomatoes (thinking). This innovative approach, praised by 1st Grade teacher Janine Murray, as "tangible, engaging, and visual," equips students with a framework for metacognitive reflection during independent reading.

Nurturing Emotional Intelligence

We strive to nurture essential character traits: self-awareness, self-regulation, empathy, and interpersonal skills—all vital pillars that support emotional and social growth.

While character development has long been a critical focus of ours, prior to the implementation of our Strategic Plan, the precise methods for instilling these values remained hard to pinpoint. Through research and introspection, we identified key elements of character development that could be explicitly taught.

One such lesson emerged, containing a powerful narrative that resonated deeply with our students. In this exercise, students were tasked with saying hurtful words to a piece of paper, only to witness the irreversible damage caused by their actions as they crumpled and attempted to smooth out the paper. This tangible demonstration illuminated a profound truth: once spoken, hurtful words cannot be fully retracted. The exercise served as a poignant reminder of the importance of mindful communication and compassionate behavior, instilling in our students a sense of responsibility towards others.



Growth Through Reflective Collaboration

Every Friday, our teachers gather for focused collaboration and reflection. Central to this effort is peer feedback-a vital aspect of our Strategic Plan for teacher excellence. Through intentional peer partnerships and collective reflection, our




enriching the educational experience for both educators and students alike.

Here are some compelling examples of how GVS Global Kids celebrates diverse cultures worldwide, imparting knowledge through age-appropriate activities that spark thoughtful discussions, broadening young minds beyond their immediate surroundings.

Guatemalan Worry Dolls

The children read *Pepe and the Parade* by Tracey Kyle, a book that revolves around a young boy named Pepe who worries that he will not be able to participate in a parade when he realizes he doesn't have a costume for the event. Drawing inspiration from the story, the children made Worry Dolls, also known as trouble dolls or muñecas quitapenas,

which are a traditional craft originating from Guatemala and other parts of Central America. According to Guatemalan folklore, these tiny dolls have the power to take away worries and anxieties when placed under a pillow at night.





Diwali: The Festival of Lights

Through the story *Let's Celebrate Diwali* by Anjali Joshi, children learned about the significance of light triumphing over darkness and shared experiences related to the celebration. After attending a Diwali assembly and watching a traditional dance by a fellow student, the children were inspired to recreate a Diwali celebration in class. They crafted clay diyas and hosted a feast adorned with diyas, symbolizing the festival's spirit.

This mat was adorned with a basket of First Fruits of the Harvest, a Unity Goblet, and corn to show appreciation for their crops, their sense of community, and their hope for the future.



In Memoriam

Justine Bayard Cushing '55



Interior Designer

Justine Bayard Cushing, an esteemed artist of interior decoration, passed away on May 5. 2023. Inspired by renowned family members such as Howard Gardiner Cushing, Lily Cushing Emmet, and Mary McFadden, Justine's work seamlessly combined elements of chinoiserie and modernism. Her legacy is marked by the comfort reminiscent of Sister Parrish's style, her initial mentor, and the grandeur reminiscent of Vincent Fourcade, a close friend.

Born to Justine Cutting Cushing and

Alexander Cochrane Cushing, founders of the Squaw Valley ski resort, Justine's upbringing was steeped in creativity and entrepreneurship. Educated at Green Vale, Truckee Elementary, and Foxcroft School, she graduated from Radcliffe College with a degree in Fine Arts in 1962. Justine's lineage traces back to Samuel Bayard and Anna Stuyvesant, early settlers of New Amsterdam, reflecting a rich history of influential ancestors in New York's development.

Growing up in Squaw Valley, Justine's artistic journey began with her parents' hospitality during the 1960 Winter Olympic Games. Her passion for design

flourished, nurtured by her experiences and education. Henry is preceded in death by his sister Mary Thompson Dwyer '39, brother Charles D.W. Thompson '42, and son James. He is fondly remembered and survived by his son Anthony.






